The mission of the Texas Board of Nursing is to protect and promote the welfare of the people of Texas by ensuring that each person holding a license as a nurse in the State of Texas is competent to practice safely. The Board fulfills its mission through the regulation of the practice of nursing and the approval of nursing education programs. This mission, derived from the Nursing Practice Act, supersedes the interest of any individual, the nursing profession, or any special interest group.

FENS Refresher Course No Longer Required for Internationally-Educated Nurses

Effective July 14, 2016, the Texas Board of Nursing (BON) no longer requires internationally-educated nurses to complete the Foreign Educated Nurses Refresher Course (FENS) as a post requisite to passing the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) for the Texas BON. Internationally-educated applicants are eligible for initial licensure in Texas if:

- the individual graduated from an approved foreign nursing education program within the past four years, or
- the individual graduated from an approved foreign nursing education program more than four years ago, but has practiced nursing within the past four years.

If an internationally-educated applicant is not eligible under either of the above two categories, then he/she must re-educate, or obtain initial nurse licensure by exam in another state, then endorse into Texas. All internationally-educated applicants for Texas nurse licensure must pass the NCLEX-PN or NCLEX-RN within four years of his/her graduation date or date of licensure eligibility.

What does 'date of licensure eligibility' mean?

For the purposes of the NCLEX, the date of licensure eligibility means the issuance date of the first Authorization to Test (ATT).

How exactly will this work?

Internationally-educated applicants will still have to fulfill all requirements including:

- Current application;
- Current exam fee;
- A completed Credentials Evaluation Service (CES) report through CGFNS, IERF, or ERES;
- A verification of license (VOL) for individuals licensed in another country;
- Proof of English proficiency (if applicable);

- Completion of a criminal background check (CBC);
- Completion of the Texas Nursing Jurisprudence Examination (NJE); and
- Registration with Pearson Vue.

The applicant who has graduated more than four years ago and who has last practiced nursing more than four years ago will need to re-educate or obtain licensure by exam in another state jurisdiction, then endorse into Texas.

What about individuals who have already passed the NCLEX, but currently have a FENS hold in the system?

The BON Information Technology Department has prepared a report listing all active "FENS" holds. Staff members are currently removing all holds for those individuals who have already passed the NCLEX (even if the refresher course had not yet been completed).

What about those individuals who have not yet passed the NCLEX, but have the FENS hold? Will their hold be removed also?

Yes. If the individual has already been deemed eligible to sit for the NCLEX and/or has an exam date scheduled, this will essentially be his/her "one shot" to test and pass the NCLEX. If they do not pass, then they will have to meet the new criteria of either having graduated within the past four years, or graduated and worked within the past four years described above. If he/she is retesting, then he/she must still be within the four years of their 'date of eligibility' (i.e. the issuance of the initial ATT).

What about applicants who graduated more than four years ago, have practiced within the last four years, but received their initial ATT over four years ago?

These applicants would either need to re-educate or obtain initial nurse licensure by exam in another state, then endorse into Texas since they are no longer within four years of the date of eligibility.

Sunset Commission to Hear Public Testimony on BON

The Texas Board of Nursing (BON) enters the second phase of review by the Texas Sunset Advisory Commission when Sunset staff members present their report and recommendations for the BON at a public hearing to be held on November 10, 2016. The meeting time and location will be announced at a later date on the Sunset Commission web site at: www.sunset.texas.gov/. The Commission will meet following the hearing to consider and vote on which changes will be recommended to the full Texas Legislature during the 85th Legislative Session. Mr. Gallagher is no longer employed with the facility. The case was referred to the Bexar County District Attorney's Office.



Valerie Lynn Martinez

Valerie Lynn Martinez secured employment and practiced as a LVN with a nursing home facility in San Antonio, Texas, between January 7, 2016 and February 12, 2016, by using the license number belonging to another nurse with the same name. When asked additional questions to verify her license, Ms. Martinez was unable to provide information to adequately explain discrepancies in the information she had provided. Valerie Lynn Martinez, a.k.a. Valerie L. Martinez, a.k.a. Valerie Martinez, a.k.a. Valerie Lynn Zetgler, does not hold a license to practice vocational nursing in the State of Texas. This case has been referred to the Bexar County District Attorney's Office.



FDA Issues New Warnings Regarding Opioids and Benzodiazepines Used in Combination

The U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently called for significant changes to the labelling and patient education information for drugs classified as opioids, as well as benzodiazepines. Opioids are often used for treatment of pain because they bind to opioid receptors in the central nervous system and reduce the perception of pain. Certain opioids may also be used in cough medicines and in drugs used to treat severe diarrhea (e.g., Lomotil). Benzodiazepines also work on the central nervous system. Drugs in this class are indicated for anxiolysis, sedation, anticonvulsant therapy, and for muscle relaxation.

The changes to the labelling and patient education information are based on a growing body of evidence that demonstrates there are significant patient safety risks when these medications are used in combination. The FDA considered several studies that demonstrated significant risks when opioids are used in combination with benzodiazepines, other drugs that depress the central nervous system, or alcohol. Risks included slowed or difficult breathing and/or sedation. Information regarding these risks will be included on black box warnings that will be added to drugs classified as opioids, as well as those classified as benzodiazepines. Health care providers are asked to educate patients and their families to seek attention immediately if they experience symptoms of unusual dizziness, lightheadedness, extreme sleepiness, slowed or difficult breathing, or unresponsiveness.

Nurses at all levels of licensure need to be aware of these changes and include this information when providing patient education. Rule 217.11(1)(C) requires nurses to know the rationale for, effects of, and correctly administer medications and treatments. The same principle applies to advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) who may be prescribing these medications. Appropriate patient education for these medications must include discussion of the side effects of the medications and when to seek health care [Rule 217.11(1)(F)].

The Texas Board of Nursing

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Summary of Actions



A regular meeting of the Board of Nursing was held July 21-22 2016, in Austin. The following is a summary of Board actions taken during this meeting.

In the **August 12, 2016** issue of the *Texas Register*, the Board of Nursing (BON or Board) proposed an amendment to §217.14, concerning *Registered Nurses Performing Radiologic Procedures*. Chapter 601, also known as the *Medical Radiologic Technologist Certification Act*, was amended during the 84th Legislative Session by Senate Bill (SB) 202. SB 202 transferred regulatory authority over medical radiologic technicians from the Department of State Health Services to the Texas Medical Board. Under SB 202, the Texas Medical Board, in conjunction with the Texas Board of Medical Radiologic Technology (an advisory board to the Texas Medical Board), retains authority to establish training requirements for medical radiologic technologists and other authorized

individuals. As a result, the proposed amendment is necessary to reflect this change. The earliest possible date of adoption is September 11, 2016.

The Board also proposed amendments to §223.1, concerning Fees. The proposed amendments seek to eliminate several unnecessary and/or outdated fees from the current rule. Currently, Staff must process the collection of these fees, which results in unnecessary delay to the licensee. Because these fees are nominal to begin with, the cost associated with the delay outweighs the benefits the fees may produce. Further, as the Board moves toward a paperless workflow system, license and record verification and duplication of certificates will be available from an online source, making the associated fees unnecessary. Finally,

elimination of the fees will only have a minimal effect on the Board's total revenue. The proposed amendments will eliminate the fees currently required for: duplicate or substitute permanent certificates; issuance of a temporary permit for completing a refresher course, a temporary permit under §301.258, or an accustomation permit; verification of licensure; verification of records; and a request for retired status [e.g., Licensed Vocational Nurse, Retired; Registered Nurse, Retired; Volunteer Retired Vocational Nurse (VR-VN); Volunteer Retired Registered Nurse (VR-RN); Volunteer Retired Registered Nurse (VR-RN) with qualifications in a given advanced practice nurse role and specialty (e.g., VR-RN, FNP)]. The earliest possible date of adoption is September 11, 2016.

Doctor of Nursing Practice: Current Practice Status and Implications for the Future

There has been much discussion within the nursing profession regarding the recent expansion of Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree programs. Practice focused doctoral programs in nursing have been offered nationally as early as 1979 (AACN, 2004 & Cronenwett et al., 2011). The Joint Commission in 2005 and the Institute of Medicine (IOM) in 1999 called for the reduction or elimination of adverse patient safety outcomes and enhancement of nursing workforce education to meet the demand for quality patient care (Walker & Polancich, 2015). Recent expansion of DNP programs has been in response to the nursing shortage and the need for safe and quality patient care within an increasingly complex healthcare delivery system.

The Landmark report of the IOM (2010), titled: *The Future of Nursing; Leading Change, Advancing Health*, provided a recommendation to double the number of nurses with a doctorate by 2020. The report highlighted the need for nurses to attain requisite competencies, such as leadership, health policy, system improvement, research and evidence-based practice, and teamwork in order to deliver high quality care (IOM, 2010). According to the progress report issued by the IOM in 2015, the nursing profession is on track to achieve the goal of *The Future of Nursing* report of doubling the number of nurses with doctoral degrees by 2020, due largely to the significant growth in DNP programs.

The DNP degree has received strong support from the nursing discipline and is appreciating a growth trend in the number of nursing academic programs offering this degree (AACN, 2015). Over the past five years, enrollment in DNP programs has more than doubled (IOM, 2015). There are currently 264 DNP programs in the United States enrolling students and an additional 60 programs in the planning stages (AACN, 2015). There were 535 nurses enrolled in a DNP program in Texas in 2013. The number of nurses with doctoral degrees in Texas was reported as 1108 in 2013, representing a 39% increase over the previous three years (Texas Team, n.d.).

It is necessary for the public to understand distinct doctoral education degrees within the nursing profession and the corresponding role and licensure levels with the goal of providing quality, safe health care (Papllham & Austin-Ketch, 2015). The practice-focused DNP is considered a terminal degree in nursing (AACN, 2006). The DNP degree prepares nurse leaders and clinicians at the highest level of practice to improve patient outcomes. The research focused doctoral programs (i.e., Doctor of Philosophy, Doctor of Nursing Science), have a main focus on scientific inquiry and knowledge generation, whereas the practice focused doctoral degree focuses on innovative and evidence-based translation of research into practice. Both practice- and research-focused doctoral programs utilize a rigorous scholarly approach and are committed to the advancement of the nursing profession (AACN, 2006).

The DNP degree is founded in clinical scholarship and, as a new paradigm of practice, provides the nurse with the sophisticated ability to evaluate and translate evidence into practice (Mundinger et al, 2009). The DNP curriculum prepares the nurse to assume a variety of leadership and practice roles and prepares the nurse to implement innovative models of care in traditional and non-traditional settings (Broome, 2015). The eight essentials of the DNP degree, as developed by the AACN (2006), prepare the nurse to provide innovative and evidence-based quality care while taking the lead in process improvement initiatives (Walker & Polancich, 2015). The DNP contributes toward improvement of public health via enhanced access to quality care for individuals accessing an increasingly intricate healthcare system. DNP prepared nurses make organizational and systems impact for the good of the community and patients. They are critical to fill the need for providing leadership roles in a variety of healthcare settings, such as academics, healthcare policy, and health administration (IOM, 2015).

Nurses at all levels of licensure and education continue to impact the nation's health by engaging in lifelong learning

and practice advancement. The nursing profession continues to demonstrate commitment to improving the nation's health and advancing the profession. The Texas Board of Nursing encourages nurses' engagement in lifelong learning as an essential competency for nurses to provide quality, safe, and competent care.

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Zika Virus: Applying the Standards of Nursing Practice

Zika virus and its subsequent complications characterize a new type of threat to public health which has the potential for lasting consequences (World Health Organization [WHO], 2016a). The WHO (2016a) calls for immediate prioritization of funding for the following areas: prevention and management of complications caused by the virus, expansion of health systems' capacities, reproductive health and risk management for pregnant women, and integrated vector management. The following article will discuss Zika and its complications, data regarding Zika virus infections in Texas, implications for nursing practice, and available resources.

Zika Virus Infection

Experts have confirmed Zika virus is spread to humans mostly through bites from infected *Aedes aegypti* and *Aedes albopictus* mosquitoes, typically day-biting mosquitos (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention [CDC], 2016f). The virus was first identified in a rhesus monkey by a group of scientists researching yellow fever in the Zika forest of Uganda in the late 1940s. In the early 1950s, the virus was confirmed in humans in Uganda and the United Republic of Tanzania. From the 1960s to 1980s, Zika virus was known to mildly affect humans throughout Africa and Asia. Outbreaks of the virus have been known to affect the regions of Africa, the Americas, Asia, and the Pacific. At present, the incubation period of the disease is still unknown but is believed to be a few days (WHO, 2016b). Over time, it appears Zika virus infection in humans has changed in character while also expanding in geographical range (Kindhauser, Allen, Frank, Santhana, & Dye, 2016).

If a healthy adult contracts the virus, the illness is often mild with symptoms of low fever, rash, joint and muscle pain, conjunctivitis, and headache, normally lasting up to one week, similar to other arbovirus symptoms; however, many people do not develop any symptoms at all (CDC, 2016f). Affected individuals should get good amounts of rest and drink plenty of fluids. Presently, there is no treatment for the virus nor is there an available preventative vaccination. The best protection is prevention of mosquito bites (WHO, 2016b).

Zika Complications

Birth Defects

The WHO reported scientific consensus as of 2015 that Zika virus can cause microcephaly (2016b). Microcephaly is a birth defect in which a newborn's head is smaller than it was expected to be compared to other babies of the same sex and age; these babies frequently have smaller, underdeveloped brains (CDC, 2016c). According to CDC, the criteria for "definite congenital microcephaly" for live births is a head circumference at birth less than the 3rd percentile for gestational age and sex or, if unable to obtain head circumference at birth, a head circumference less than the 3rd percentile for age and sex within the first six weeks of life. In the cases of stillbirths and elective terminations, head circumference at delivery less than the 3rd percentile for gestational age and sex classifies as "definite congenital microcephaly" (2016b). In addition to microcephaly, Zika virus infection during pregnancy can lead to other adverse outcomes, such as miscarriage, eye defects, hearing loss, and impaired growth in infants. Unfortunately, there is still much that is unknown about Zika virus and the risks to unborn babies (CDC, 2016g). According to CDC, as of September 8, 2016, there have been 671 reported cases of pregnant women in the United States (U.S.) with laboratory evidence of possible Zika infection (2016d).

Guillain-Barré Syndrome

The WHO also confirms scientific agreement that Zika virus can cause Guillain-Barré syndrome (GBS), reasons for which are still unknown (2016b). GBS is a disorder in which the body's immune system attacks part of the peripheral nervous system. The first symptoms usually include tingling and weakness in the lower extremities, which can quickly spread to the upper body and then the entire body, causing paralysis. Though there is no cure at present, there are treatments to diminish the symptoms and duration, and most people recover over time (National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, 2011). CDC is continuing to research the link between GBS and Zika. GBS has been linked to seven Zika cases in the U.S. as of September 13, 2016 (CDC, 2016a).

Incidence of Zika in the U.S. and Texas

As of September 13, 2016, there have been 161 confirmed cases of Zika in Texas

associated with travel, but there have not been any confirmed locally acquired cases of Zika. There were 43 locally acquired mosquito-borne cases in the U.S. as of September 13, 2016, all of which have occurred in Florida. As of that same date, there have been 2,964 total cases of Zika in the U.S., this includes locally acquired mosquito-borne, travel-associated, and laboratory acquired (CDC, 2016a).

Implications for Healthcare Providers

Healthcare professionals are the best poised to educate patients about Zika virus, the associated complications, prevention, management, and available resources. Education should include information regarding prevention of mosquito bites, as this is the best protection at present. CDC recommends the use of an Environmental Protection Agency-registered insect repellent with one of the following active ingredients: DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, or IR3535. They also caution all users to follow the instructions on the product label, including age-related warnings (2016e). Additionally, because there have been documented human-to-human sexually transmitted cases of Zika, safe sex practices and abstinence should be practiced by individuals, especially pregnant women, living in endemic areas and by persons who have partners who have traveled to areas where Zika is locally transmitted, even if they are free from symptoms (WHO, 2016b). According to the WHO, patients should be provided education regarding family planning, and families planning to conceive a child should wait a minimum of 8 weeks before trying to achieve pregnancy if no Zika symptoms are present and 6 months if either partner has symptoms of Zika (2016b).

As with any patient care situation, responding to emerging diseases in our communities requires nurses to practice in accordance with all the laws, rules and regulations applicable to their practice. Texas Board of Nursing (Board) Rule 217.11, Standards of Nursing Practice, establishes the minimum acceptable level of nursing practice for nurses practicing in the state of Texas at all licensure levels (2016). To provide care consistent with the minimum standards, all nurses must know and conform to not only the Texas Nursing Practice Act and Board Rules and Regulations but also with all feder-

al, state or local laws, rules or regulations affecting their area of nursing practice [22 TAC §217.11(1)(A)]. According to CDC (2016a), Zika virus disease and any Zika-related in utero infections are nationally notifiable conditions, and the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) categorizes Zika as a Texas Notifiable Condition, requiring report of both confirmed and suspected cases within one week (2016). Nurses must collaborate with members of the health care team [22 TAC §217.11(1)(P)], and this includes collaboration with the state health department to report information about pregnant women with laboratory evidence of Zika virus or suspected congenital Zika virus exposure in infants. Further, proper notification of the Texas DSHS or CDC if there is a possible Zika related miscarriage, elective abortion, perinatal or infant death is also suggested (CDC, 2016g). The policies and procedures available at each agency or facility can help guide staff to determine how to notify and make appropriate referrals; this is in accordance with Board Rule 217.11(1)(Q). All nurses are required to implement measures to promote a safe environment [22 TAC §217.11(1)(B)], and remaining informed is one aspect of promoting safe patient care. Because this is an evolving topic, new research findings and data are constantly released, and nurses must stay up-to-date with the latest information about Zika [22 TAC §217.11(1)(R)]. Nurses can promote patient teaching and education [22 TAC §217.11(1)(F)] more effectively if they continue efforts to obtain information and training regarding this new and unfamiliar care situation [22 TAC §217.11(1)(H)]. Beyond educating patients in the management of the spread of infections, nurses have a duty to implement measures to prevent exposure to infectious pathogens and communicable conditions [22 TAC §217.11(1)(O)]. And, while much is still to be discovered about the long-term effects of this virus, nurses must provide care without discrimination to patients who are infected or believed to be infected with Zika [22 TAC §217.11(1)(L)].

Zika Related Resources

There are multiple governmental resources available for healthcare professionals and the public alike. In April 2016, CDC published "Zika—CDC Interim Response Plan," a drafted response plan which describes the CDC Emergency Response Team (CERT), a lineup of trained public health experts who are available to assist communities that have identified locally transmitted cases of Zika. CDC (2016h) announced a CERT could

be requested by any local, state, or tribal jurisdiction by contacting their Emergency Operations Center at (770) 488-7100 or eocreport@cdc.gov.

To help uncover more data about Zika virus and how it affects pregnant women and their unborn children, CDC established the *US Zika Pregnancy Registry*. Ideally, this will serve to update clinical care recommendations as new information is determined. Healthcare providers should report any pregnant women with laboratory evidence of Zika virus infection, with or without symptoms of the virus, as these patients and their babies are eligible for the Registry. Texas nurses can participate in the *US Zika Pregnancy Registry* by recognizing pregnant women and infants eligible for Zika virus testing in accordance with State or CDC guidelines and coordinating testing (CDC, 2016g).

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CMS Launches Partnership to Improve Dementia Care: Non-Pharmacologic Methods to Manage Dementia Symptoms Encouraged

In 2012, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) launched the National Partnership to Improve Dementia Care in Nursing Homes, an initiative to enhance the quality of life for people with dementia in nursing facilities, protect them from substandard care, and promote goal-directed, person-centered care. One key quality measurement was reducing the inappropriate use of anti-psychotic medications for residents with dementia. Additional information on this initiative can be found on the CMS website.

While this measure has been posted on the CMS Nursing Home Compare website since 2012, CMS only recently added the measure on anti-psychotic medication use to its calculation of a nursing facility's Five Star Quality Rating. CMS also has integrated focused dementia care surveys into the routine survey process. The goal is to ensure that individuals with dementia have care plans that call for non-pharmacologic methods to manage symptoms of dementia, as well as documentation to substantiate the use of anti-psychotic medications. If an individual has another documented mental health diagnosis, this care plan also should have documentation detailing how long the individual has been diagnosed and how the diagnosis was made, if it is a recent occurrence.
